

Pike's Time Has Arrived

Our purpose is to establish the Pike National Historic Trail for all 3664 miles of the 1806-1807 Pike Expedition.

We welcome the interest from many across the nation of folks interested in creating a lasting memorial to one of our country's heroes- Brigadier General Zebulon Montgomery Pike.

We enjoy the interest and involvement of the Pike Family, many of those involved in bringing the Pike Bicentennial to the nation's attention, the support of four other long distance trails, and have the attention of federal agencies.

We have visited with those who have gone through the process of establishing National Trails, who know who to contact and know where some of the rocks are. We have gained valued, knowledgeable advice, and garnered a growing list of supporters and a nucleus group. Currently, we are considering the material needed in the first step in the process of establishing a National Historic Trail.

The Route

Pike's responsibility was to explore portions of the newly acquired Louisiana Purchase, this after returning Osage Native Americans to their home. The route covered 3664 miles from St. Louis on the Missouri and Osage Rivers, up the Arkansas River watershed, down the Rio del Norte (Rio Grande- starting 160 miles from its headwaters), traversing through central New Spain, through Texas and ending in western Louisiana.

Ground artifacts of Pike's expedition are difficult to find. There are, of course, no wagon ruts. Our suggested route will not likely be an overlay the path of the Expedition, but, like many historic trails, will follow roads to visit known sites and memorials.

What parts of Pike's Route are already established?

There are many markers and memorials in place, and much of the route is known. Expert, detailed advice is being used to pinpoint route, and campsites using available data including Pike's maps. Three established trails follow his route.

<u>Santa Fe Trail</u>- The Main/Northern Route of the Santa Fe National Historic Trail is contiguous with Pike's route from Great Bend, KS to LaJunta, CO, a distance of 303 miles.

<u>American Discovery Trail</u>- The American Discovery Trail is also contiguous with the Pike Expedition route from Great Bend, KS to near Cripple Creek, CO (north of Canon City, CO, a distance of 426 miles (303 of which is the Santa Fe Trail.)

El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro- An International effort

El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro National Historic Trail (Spanish Road of the Interior) stretches from the San Juan Pueblo Reservation (north of Santa Fe) along the Rio Grande to El Paso, for 349 miles. The Mexican continuation of this US National Historic Trail, through an International effort, continues south through Chihuahua and Mexico City.

It is believed that Pike and his men may have been brought along this route. To establish a designation on the Spanish road from Torreon (Durango Mexico) toward Monterey and San Antonio (the route the Spanish probably used for Pike) will require additional Mexican cooperation.

Distance on El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro 837 miles (349 mi. in US and 488 mi. from El Paso to Torreon, Durango, Mexico.)

<u>Perhaps, then, there may be 1263 of 3664 miles (426 + 837) or 35%, already in place.</u>



Did you know?

- <u>Pikes Peak</u>, the 14,110 foot "Grand Mountain" which Zebulon was unable to bag, is the location where <u>America, The Beautiful</u> was penned.
- <u>Telegraph Gulch</u> in the Royal Gorge, where Pike is believed to have climbed out of the Gorge, was recently renamed Pike's Gulch. The incline into the Gorge fills Pike's Gulch.





The Small Blue Cloud Probably the best known of Pike memorials is Pike's Peak. At 2 pm on November 15, 2006, many of us stood in the place Pike and his men stood 200 years to the minute, when he sited the "small blue cloud." He called it the Grand Mountain, the Spanish and Ute indians called it El Capitan. At that place one can no longer see Pike's Peak because of the John Martin Reservoir. The location is south of Ft. Lyons Hospital in Las Animas, CO, where Kit Carson later died.

The Santa Fe Trail Assn. and others were dedicating this rock where Pike first saw the "small blue cloud," 117 miles away.
