# Wishing you a festive Christmas and a Joy-filled New Year

### 1805-6

Pike spent Tuesday and Wednesday Christmas Eve and Day below Brainerd, Minnesota [32 miles north of Little Falls on the Mississippi River] 25th December, 1805 ...-

"Marched, and Encamped at 11 o'clock. Gave out two pound of extra meat—- 2 pound of extra flour, one gill of whiskey and some tobacco per man—- by way of a little distinguishing mark on Christmas Day." - Pike Journal On the 26th, they had to fix four of their broken sleds. That took time.

Pike spent Tuesday and Wednesday New Year's Eve and Day another 25 miles north between Crosby and Aitkin, Minnesota with his men's concern for his safety. .

#### 1st January, Wednesday 1806.-

"Passed six very elegant bark canoes, on the bank of the river, which had been laid up by the Chippeways... My interpreter came after me in a great hurry, and conjured me not to go so far ahead, as he assured me the Chippeways rencountering me without my interpreter, party or flag, would certainly kill me. But, notwithstanding, I went on several miles further than usual, in order to make any discovery which was to be made—-

Made some extra presents &c. for new Year's Day." - Pike Journal

### 1806-7

24th December, Wednesday.- Salida, CO "The party's provisions extending only to the 23rd, ... [we] killed four cows. ... Some being in the starving condition we had eight beeves [now] in our camp. We now again found ourselves all assembled together on Christmas Eve, and appeared generally to be content, although all the refreshment we had to celebrate that day with, was buffalo meat, without salt, or anything whatever." - Pike Journal

25th December, Thursday.- Salida, CO "It being stormy weather and having meet to dry; I concluded to lie by this date. Here I must take the liberty of observing that in this situation, the hardships and privations we underwent, were on this day brought more fully to our mind. Having been accustomed to some degree of relaxation, and extra enjoyments; but here 800 miles from the frontiers of our country, in the most inclement season of the year; not one person clothed for winter, many without blankets, (having been obliged to cut them up for socks, &c.) and now lying down at night on the snow or wet ground; one side burning whilst the other was pierced with a cold wind: this was in part the situation of the party whilst some were endeavoring to make a miserable substitute of raw buffalo hide for shoes &c. I will not speak of diet, as I conceive that to be beneath the serious consideration of a man on the voyage of such nature. We spent the day as agreeably as we could be expected from men in our situation. Caught a new species, having made a trap for him." - Pike Journal

# Red Canyon/Fourmile Creek [Cañon City, CO] Shelf Rd. [Cripple Creek, CO] by Alan Vainley

Jim Chapman recently contacted me when he was attempting to locate Pike's encampment # 31 on December 11, 1806 in the Red Canyon/Fourmile Creek [Cañon City, CO] Shelf Rd. [Cripple Creek] area where his cattle ranch is located.

Since then I have been made aware of a number of interesting facts about that valley.

They are

† Indian trails in the valley probably followed by Pike,

† a 20 foot cliff and a 5 foot waterfall which Pike likely went around on an Indian trail

† the Espinoza brothers,

† why 4mile Ck was called Oil Creek at one time and by Pike,

the sale of Jim's cattle ranch.

# I. Indian trails, probably followed by Pike, a 20 foot cliff and a 5 foot waterfall in the valley

Pike has been following the Spanish trace of Lt. Facundo Malgares from the Pawnee Village in northern Kansas and along the Arkansas River. He was still looking for that trace as he approached South Park Colorado north of today's Cañon City.

11th December, Thursday.- Marched at 10 o'clock, and in one mile struck a branch of the Arkansas, on which the *supposed* Spaniards had encamped, where there was both water and grass. Kept up this branch, but was frequently embarrassed as to the trace; at three o'clock PM having no sign of it, halted and encamped, and went out to search it; found it about 1 mile to the right. Distance 15 miles. - Pike's Journal.

Jim made me aware that our plots of Pike's route and the story which appeared in the <u>Pike Newsletter</u> of July-August 2014 was incorrect in two locations where a 20 foot cliff and a 5 foot waterfall would have altered his path onto an Indian Trail in the snow and weak horses.

### II. The Bitterness of Felipe and Vivian Espinosa 1

#### Colorado History related to Pike

Jose Vivian and Felipe Nerio Espinosa (c.1827-1863) were notorious Mexican-American murderers who killed a documented 8 'gringoes' in the Colorado Territory throughout the spring of 1863 [between March 18 and May 4.] The Espinosa brothers were stealing horses and committing robberies in Conejos County, CO for some years prior to the murder spree. <sup>2</sup> Their property was subsequently confiscated.

Following the Mexican–American War (1846–1848) many Hispanic people, including the Espinoza's, had lost title to their lands [ceded to them by the 1848 <u>Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo</u> Treaty] in territory courts. Some accounts indicate another motive may have been the raping of family members.

Beginning their murder spree on March 18, 1863 in the today's Fremont County near Wetmore [site of a Pike Assoc roadside panel], Colorado; the Espinosa brothers brutally murdered their first victim. During that summer, more anglos were attacked and killed in similar fashion. <sup>3</sup>

The California Gulch Posse, under their own vigilante authority and the US Calvary pursued the two. A posse from Park County, Colorado finally managed to track the brothers in their hideout northeast of Cañon City, Colorado in the Red Canyon/Fourmile Creek [formally Oil Creek]. In May 1863, Vivian was killed on today's Espinosa Creek [see map] but Felipe escaped. 4

During the following summer, Felipe and Jose Vincente, his fourteen-year-old nephew resumed the rampage. Soon after, legendary tracker Tom Tobin found the outlaws' camp in the mountains west of La Veta, Colorado and killed both Espinosas.

Following the tracking of Tobin and a gun fight with the Felipe and Jose, a cousin named Julian Espinosa continued their deadly vendetta as more and more men were killed. <sup>5</sup>

- <sup>2</sup> Several sources document 'an estimated thirty-two people' were slaughtered. "The thirty-two victims mentioned in many accounts of the incident have never been substantiated and is almost certainly an exaggeration." Dave Walker, December 3, 2022.
- <sup>3</sup> The second murder occurred on the next day at a place 10 miles south of Colorado Spring near Fountain Creek; the third killing occurred a few days later near present-day Lake George. The remaining five murders occurred in South Park within 18 miles from the town of Fairplay. Dave Walker, December 3, 2022.
- 4 The posse of Park County volunteers consisted of a group of seventeen miners from California Gulch, which is located near Leadville. This posse may have also been known as the "Colorado Volunteers". Among the latest victims of the murderers were two men who were also from California Gulch and were well known to the members of the posse. The California Gulch Posse and the US Calvary worked independently from each other. Of course, the soldiers were mounted on horses, however, you might be surprised to know that the posse had several pack animals with them, but that all of the men traveled on foot. # III. Oil Creek

Fourmile Creek was originally named Oil Creek. A reason for that is the number of oil seeps along Fourmile Creek.

If you traveled up Fourmile creek from Cañon City or down from Cripple Creek on roads like Red Canyon or Shelf Road and seen the Longhorn sheep above the high bordering cliffs, you might have noticed "Oil Well Flats Trail System" or "BLM Seep Springs OHV Area" beside Garden Park Fossil Area or near Red Canyon Park.

Pike passed by the BLM managed Sheep Springs and encamped on 10th December, 1806 [Wednesday] on Long Gulch- Fourmile Ck (6280'). It may have been noticed by him. However, snow may have hampered any viewing of the seep.

### Introducing Clarissa

Which one- mother or daughter?

We located an image of 'Clarissa Pike'. It was not sourced, so therefore we could not verify which Clarissa the painting represents.

After some research, Linda Balough would place the photo dress as in the middle 1810s (1810 to 1820s).

Here is information for an age comparison to the painting.

#### Clarissa Brown Pike Zebulon and Clarissa Pike's daughter

B: 24 Feb 1803 Virginia

D: 1 Feb 1837 Boone County, Kentucky

Pike's daughter would have been 7 to 17 years old. It is unlikely it is the daughter.

#### Clarrisa Harlow Brown Pike Zebulon Pike's wife

B: 30 Aug 1780 Canterbury, Windham, CT

D: 13 APR 1847 Francisville, Boone Co., KY (or Sugar Grove)
Pike's wife would have been 30 to 40 years old.

This seems a better match.



Linda looked at a number of resources. "One particularly comprehensive site showed dresses with nearly identical features and the hairstyle is right. Of course, we can't be 100% sure, but if the age info indicates the portrait is one or the other, then the strong assumption is that it is Pike's wife."

Our conclusion is that the painting is that of Clarissa Harlow Brown Pike, Zebulon Montgomery's spouse. What's your conclusion?
